BANKS FARM

Copyhold of the Manor of Bexhill

PROPERTY DETAILS (NGR TQ 7340 1048)

This has not been known as Banks for many years. The last owner called it Spring Farm as there is a spring on the property. Banks presumably got it's name from the 17th century occupier John Banks. Hackwoods Farm (P5/18) should be read in conjunction with Banks because Hackwoods became known as Banks in the 19th century. Banks was only a small holding of just over 5 acres which included a track running up from Watermill Lane as the access. There are and have always been only two fields, mainly of scrub. This has always been a seperate unit and still is.

	fairly large orchard which may, at one time, been the kitchen
	garden of the old Banks Farmhouse. At the far end was a cess pool
	used in connection with the slaughterhouse. The slaughterhouse
	ceased being in use for butchers during World War Two but
	continued as a knackers yard for elderly animals until the 1950's.

Mr Donne describes the building as being in two sections, one for keeping animals, the other in which they were killed. Well built with nine inch thick brick walls (including the party wall) rising to their peak about 20 feet. The orchard still there but almost impenetrable. (12)

- 1920 Oct 18 Hugh Sydney Egerton of Mountfield Court and others to Mr H Carter of 31 Devonshire Road Bexhill..... and all those parcels of land etctogether with the slaughterhouse and buildings erected......
- 1947 Feb 3 Harry Carter of 31 Devonshire Road but later of 'Heatherdene' The Highlands Bexhill retired Butcher (vendor) and Mr and Mrs V Hastings Pet Shop Proprieter of 10 High Street Bexhill (purchaser) for the sum of £450. All that land together with the slaughterhouse and buildings erected thereon. (Mortgage of £3250)
- 1951 Nov 12 Mr and Mrs V.L. Hastings, Slaughterhouse Proprieter of 10 High Street and Earnest J.E. Pilbeam of Diplocks Farm Chalvington Slaughterman..... All that 5 acres 3 perches... with slaughterhouse and buildings erected.
- 1972 Apr 12 Earnest Pilbeam of Diplocks Farm Chalvington to Rodney R Sargent of 'Woodlands' Collington Lane West. All that Etc with buildings thereon. (Note. There is no longer any mention of a slaughterhouse)
