KEWHURST FARM

Copyhold of the Manor of Barnhorn.

The name means Caega's enclosure (OE Caeagn Woro, Kaynworth c1200, Keyworth 1296, Carworth, Kayworth 1306) There are no later forms to show how, or when - worth was altered to -hurst in this name. (1) Also known as Cowhurst in 19th century.

PROPERTY DETAILS (NGR TQ 7199 0790)

The later farmhouse is now gone. It was built in c1750 by the Cranston family. They called the wood nearby Parsons Wood as one of the Cranstons was in Holy Orders. (2) The present house, now called Kewhurst Manor, was built in 1895 and was converted into flats in 1955.

In the 18th century and presumably earlier, there was a seperate holding call CABACK lying to the west of Kewhurst and to the south of the Little Common Road and adjoining Cooden Sea Road on the west. The house and barn to this property were situated where St Martha's Church is now. Richard Fuller had this as copyhold to Barnhorn Manor, owner Sir Thomas Webster. (3) Caback had been amalgamated with Kewhurst by 1840 as can be seen on the Tithe Map. (5)
